

## CAREER OUTLOOK

Anthropologists and archeologists typically work in research organizations, government, and consulting firms. Although most work in an office, some analyze samples in laboratories or do fieldwork.

According to the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment of anthropologists and archeologists is projected to grow 4 percent from 2014 to 2024. Prospective anthropologists and archeologists will likely face strong competition for jobs because of the small number of positions relative to applicants.

If you are interested in pursuing a career in this field, you will need to continue your education to the Master's or Ph.D. level. The median annual wage for anthropologists or archeologists with an advanced degree was \$63,190 in May 2016.

This program prepares students for a Bachelor's degree in Anthropology. This program provides the framework for a scientific and comprehensive study of human behavior and society and introduces students to the major subfields of anthropology and the various associated specializations. Upon completion of the program, students will be able to make informed choices regarding their careers and academic areas of specialization. Students will be able to work effectively with diverse ethnic populations in many different disciplines such as education, healthcare, human and social services, and business and community development.

### Graduates of this program will be able to:

- Distinguish between career options in terms of anthropological subfields and how cultures are studied through fieldwork
- Develop the necessary skills to critically think the important role culture has in defining the human experience and how an awareness of cultural universals can decrease cross-cultural misunderstandings
- Recognize the role globalization and cultural diffusion have on culture change
- Apply anthropological methods to the solving of social problems
