Lifelong Learning's favorite historian, Dr. Christopher Bellitto, has published a new book, *Humility: The Secret History of a Lost Virtue*

We live in an age of bombast, vitriol, and ego.
In the midst of what seems like an endless sea of
'self'-promotion – and even 'self'-realization that seems
cut off from a grander, more Divine Self – humility is

indeed a most urgent virtue. Bellitto's book is a balm for the heart.

Humility, a cultural history, and biography of the idea of humility, argues that the frightening alternative to humility has been the death of civility. Dr. Bellitto explores humility in Greco-Roman history, philosophy, and literature; in the ancient and medieval Jewish, Christian, and Muslim scriptures and sermons; in the Enlightenment; and in contemporary discussion of education in virtue and citizenship.



The book offers a fresh perspective on the lost virtue of humility for those of us concerned with the culture wars and interested in finding a path to renewed civility. Join the "God Squad," Dr. Bellitto and Rabbi Susman for an intriguing, lively, and timely discussion of the many ways a loss of humility leads to excessive individualism, lack of respect for one another, arrogance, and narcissism. How did we lose our civility? How can it be reclaimed?

The talk will be followed by a Q&A and book signing by Dr. Bellitto. *Humility: The Secret of a Lost Virtue* will be available for purchase the day of the program.

More importantly, examine how certain horror films directly reflected American social changes, including *The Wolf Man, Invasion of the Body Snatchers, The Blob,* and *Psycho*. The western genre far predates the advent of cinema and is truly a form of American mythology. We'll examine these narratives' roots in the American experience, and their themes of honor, individualism, and the pursuit of justice. We'll view examples from *The Great Train Robbery, The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance*, and *Unforgiven*.

The musical genre was born of the natural adaptation from musical theater into film. We'll discuss how early musicals like *The Jazz Singer* and *42nd Street* helped to develop musical genre conventions unique to cinema. First, discover the origins of Ukraine and the Ukrainian People from Prince Vladimir/Volodymyr and Kievan Rus. Move on to the Middle Ages and discuss Ukraine as part of Poland-Lithuania; the influx of Jews into the area, their function and their relationship with their Christian neighbors. Then analyze Ukraine under Tsar and Emperor: from the 18th to the 20th century, developments affecting Ukrainians and their Jewish neighbors, and the rise of nationalism. Finally, understand the developments of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries: under the Soviets, the Second World War, and the Holocaust. Now an independent state, how has Ukraine fared and what might the future hold? 4 SESSIONS







Ghosts Of The Atlantic Coast: Shipwrecks Along The Jersey Shore

After the ships of European explorers Giovanni Verrazzano and Henry Hudson ventured along New Jersey's coast, they were followed over the next 400 years by countless vessels with settlers, soldiers, fishermen, and cargo. An unknown number of these ships met

their end on Jersey's 130-mile-long shore. Storms, sandbars, accidents, or acts of violence created treacherous circumstances that claimed wrecks from Sandy Hook to Cape May. Come explore some of their stories and remember these local ghosts of the Atlantic Coast.

Fort Monmouth's "Famous Firsts"

The history of Fort Monmouth begins in May 1917 when, as part of its wartime mobilization, the Army authorized four training camps for signal troops. Tinton Falls Ironworks Site In Tinton Falls

In 1675, Col. Lewis Morris purchased an ironworks along the Swimming River, calling it "Tinton Manor." More than sixty enslaved Africans, the first to arrive in Monmouth County, were brought from Morris's sugar plantations in Barbados and forced to work at what is now Tinton Falls. An unknown number of these enslaved people are buried in unmarked graves in the cemetery here.

Marlpit Hall In Middletown

Many enslaved Blacks, such as Elizabeth Van Cleaf, lived at Marlpit Hall, owned by the Taylor family. The current award-winning exhibit, Beneath the Floorboards, Whispers of the Enslaved shows how slavery took root in early Monmouth County, as well as the complex dynamics of daily life and relationships among the enslaved.

The T. Thomas Fortune Cultural Center In Red Bank

Former home of the one-time enslaved Timothy Thomas Fortune who lived here into the early 20th century while publishing Black newspapers in New York. An exhibit called The Black Press, Stewarts of Democracy and other aspects of Black cultural life will be on display. Catered lunch will be enjoyed at this location.
