
Local Author - Book Talk

Challenging the Misconceptions Of The United Nations By Michael Curtin

Challenging the Misconceptions of the United Nations seeks to alter the negative narrative surrounding the United Nations. Not only does the author address present-day issues, but he paints a picture of the post-World War II time-period when delegates at a San Francisco conference came together to form what we now call the United Nations. While looking into the past progress the UN has made, Curtin examines the current stigma against it and how its dismantlement, as some in the current US political climate would like to see, could dramatically affect the welfare of millions worldwide.



An Exploration Of Five Points, NYC: 1824-1895

Lyndell O'Hara PhD, historian

In the nineteenth century, the Five Points neighborhood of lower Manhattan was one of the most famous places in the world, and not in a positive light! Here African American domestic immigrants lived side by side with waves of Irish, Jewish, Italian and Chinese immigrants, all seeking to find their place in a city of opportunity. Tammany politics and Christian missions each sought the loyalty of the inhabitants. Squalor and destitution prevailed in a neighborhood that supported dance halls, theater, and opera houses as well as boxing rings and numerous taverns. The racial, ethnic, and religious tensions often exploded into riots, giving voice to issues the majority of New Yorkers refused to recognize. In the midst of it all, a political, artistic and social creativity emerged which would become part of what it meant to be "American." 3 SESSIONS

Everything Old Is New Again: Israeliana Collecting Of The 1940's-1970's

Rachael Goldman, PhD

The establishment of the State of Israel was a monumental moment in Jewish history. It also led to a breakthrough in Jewish art, with the creation of new sorts of ritual pieces. A new type of art emerged that celebrated the traditional images of the new State: Israeliana. Forms feature the Maccabees, the Spies of Joshua, and the flora and fauna of Ancient Israel. Visitors to the newborn and developing state participated in celebrating it by being consumers of "luxury" goods and trinkets: items produced exclusively for the tourist trade, which contributed directly to the new economy. These mass-produced pieces, designed by Israelis, aimed to put Israel's new identity into the hands of Jews around the world. Visitors to this exciting, newborn, and developing state celebrated it by being consumers of "luxury" goods and trinkets. Bringing these art pieces home, Jews around the world could proudly display what Israel represented to them, both in practice and in theory.

Dr. Rachael Goldman holds a PhD from the City University of New York-Graduate Center in History. She is the author of *Color-Terms in* a Social and Cultural Context in Ancient Rome published by Gorgias Press. She has studied at the Summer Classical School at the American Academy in Rome and won awards for the New York Classical School. She has been published in the journal Glotta, the Bryn Mawr Classical Review, the Classical Journal, the Renaissance Quarterly and the Decorative Arts Journal of the Bard Graduate Center. She has taught at Adelphi University, the College of New Jersey, Rutgers College, and at various schools in City University of New York. She completed the Sotheby's American Fine and Decorative Arts course, and began her career as an appraiser, cataloguing the Asia and Jacobo Furman Judaica Collection. As a specialist for Bonhams, she ushered in the first Judaica sale. Rachael is a certified member of the Appraisers Association of America.

Power, Propaganda & The Tudor Dynasty Through The Lens Of History & Art

Lyndell O'Hara, PhD, historian, Gene Wisnieski, artist, teacher, author



Although ruling for less than 120 years, the Tudors remain one of the most famous royal dynasties in history, and a source of endless fascination. In pre-modern times, when most of the population of any country was illiterate, political

leaders depended on visual depictions of themselves to convey their power and authority. In fifteenth and sixteenth century England, the kings and queens of the Tudor Dynasty were fortunate to have access to some of the greatest Renaissance artists to illustrate their royal supremacy. In an era of dramatic religious, social and political change, in the midst of challenges to their very right to rule, Tudor monarchs portrayed their wealth and power through portraits.

Historian Lyndell O'Hara will share the tumultuous reigns of Henry VII, Henry VIII, Edward VI, Mary and Elizabeth, providing context for artist, Gene Wisniewski's discussion of the part the clothing they're shown wearing and other subtle symbols appearing in the family's royal portraits played in communicating their power.

Discover the History of the guitar as heard through the music.

Classical Guitar

Explore creation of the modern guitar in Spain. Hear the guitar from it's early classical music roots through the music of Fernando Sor, Francisco Tarrega, Hector Villa-Lobos and more. Listen to performances by Andres Segovia, Christopher Parkening and Liona Boyd as you gain an understanding of Spanish classical guitar.

Jazz Guitar

Continue to trace the evolution of the guitar through jazz music. Listen to jazz guitar as played by the early acoustic pioneers Eddie Lang, Carl Kress and Dick McDonough. Then discover the electric guitar from it's early master's Charlie Christian, Tal Farlow, Jimmy Rainey. 

Explore Black History Sites in Monmouth County on a **Local Tour** & **Talk** with Gilda Rogers executive director of the T. Thomas Fortune Cultural Center, writer, activist, adjunct faculty, Brookdale Community College and Rick Geffken, author, local historian.

APRIL 25th Black History Sites In Freehold, Monmouth County

Bethel AME Church & Cemetery The Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church at 3 Waterworks Road in Freehold was completed in 1988. The congregation has outlived slavery, both world wars, and segregation under Jim Crow. Its history dates back to the 1690s, when free blacks formed a village called Squirrel Town. Bethel offered a safe space for black worshipers who were excluded from predominantly white churches for Sunday services and who, decades later, encountered racism in the borough's slowly desegregating schools. Black Civil War soldiers of the United States Colored Troops are interred in the Church Cemetery near Squirrel

Court Street School

Town.

Since 1915, the once all-Black Court Street School in Freehold Borough has had legendary teachers and successful graduates. Now called the Court Street School Education Community Center, the building is one of two still-standing former segregated schools in New Jersey. The building was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1995. Dr. Walter Greason (Chair of the History Department at Macalester College in Saint Paul, MN) who was born in Freehold, says the school formed the heart of the black middle class and was instrumental in New Jersey's civil rights movement.

Monmouth Battlefield State Park

Located on the border of Manalapan and Freehold Township, the Revolutionary War's crucial battle of Monmouth Courthouse was waged in June 1778. One of the largest battles of the war, it demonstrated that the Continental Army could successfully fight professional British forces.

Fighting for both sides, Black soldiers were part of this historic struggle. Seven hundred fought for the patriots; the Black Brigade and the Black Pioneers joined the British effort. Billy Lee, a non-combatant enslaved man owned by Gen. George Washington, was at the battle.

JUNE 18th A Juneteenth Celebration Tour Of Black History Sites In Monmouth County

Learn more about the origins and significance of Juneteenth and commemorate the day through a talk and tour of three black historic sites in Monmouth County. Trolley transportation will be provided.

Cedar View Cemetery in Lincroft, an 1850 cemetery containing the interments of formerly enslaved people, Civil War veterans (called U.S. Colored Troops), and their descendants. The burying ground has been recently renovated by the nonprofit Friends of Cedar View.

The T. Thomas Fortune Cultural Center in Red Bank, former home of the one-time enslaved, Timothy Thomas Fortune who lived there into the early 20th century while publisher of Black newspapers in New York. Numerous exhibits of Black cultural life on display. Catered lunch will be enjoyed at this location.

Wampum Park Memorial to Mingo Jack

in Eatontown where the only recorded lynching of a New Jersey Black man, Samuel Johnson, occurred in 1886.

Gilda Rogers is a journalist, author & playwright, producer & director, and an educator. She was at the helm of a community group that came together and organized in

2013 to save the National Historic Landmark, located in Red Bank and the former home of the social justice crusader, journalist and newspaper publisher, T. Thomas Fortune. She has been honored with numerous awards as part of her commitment to the greater Red Bank community, including her contributions to the Monmouth County Historical Association's current exhibition Beneath the Floorboards, Whispers of the Enslaved at Marlpit Hall.

Rick Geffken has taught New Jersey slavery for Monmouth University in West Long Branch. He is part of a project called the New Jersey Slavery

Records Index under the auspices of Rutgers University, New Brunswick, NJ. He is an active member of the New Jersey Social Justice Reconciliation Committee and was instrumental in placing a memorial plaque in Eatontown, the 1886 site of the only recorded lynching of a Black man in New Jersey. He too contributed to *Beneath the Floorboards Whispers of the Enslaved*. Rick was the recipient of the 2023 Jane G. Clayton Award honoring individuals who've made exceptional contributions to the awareness, understanding or preservation of Monmouth County history.


Lisa Levart – a photographer on a mission!

For over twenty-five years, Lisa has traveled near and far to create iconic portraits that uncover the spirit

of independent girls, ferocious women, powerful warrior activists and epic elders and weaves together the personal and collective journeys of women's lives.

Her work has been exhibited widely, from galleries in NYC, to museums, and as site-specific installations. It is represented in the permanent collection of the 9/11 Memorial Museum in NYC and was recognized by the Julia Margaret Cameron Award's for Women Photographers, a Larry Salley Photography Award and a Brigit Award from the Association for the Study of Women and Mythology.

Lisa will share her journey from photographing glamorous weddings to photographing women as Goddesses – witnessing, evoking, and capturing the essence of everyday women, their goddess archetypes, stories and myths. The portraits are culturally diverse and grounded in a sense of place, the land. The work blends several mediums, including collage, film, multi-media, dance and photography.

Laura will read from two of her most recent collections of poetry, *The Wild Night Dress* and *Women & Other Hostages*,


