Exploring Poetry Together


Ed Ryterband, PhD, poet, author and Alba de Bello, poet, founder A Child's Place

Despite fierce opposition, she transformed herself into the 'Mother' of America's 1900s labor movement.

Art Detectives: The British Museum Rachael Goldman, PhD, historian

The collecting and maintaining of artistic and historically significant objects require special attention to their acquisition history, conservation and attribution. Without this information about a work of art, questions about its true ownership and country of origin can arise. Thousands of artworks changed hands after WWII and through colonization activities. These types of events can cause major upheavals to the world's major art collections. Even innocent collecting can result in the disruption of established collections and exhibitions. The British Museum is an example of an encyclopedic collection from every era and civilization. Pieces like the Ancient Greek Parthenon Marbles and the Benin Bronzes have been considered their most appealing but contentious holdings. We will discuss the importance of their position within a museum's provenance. Understanding the provenance of a collection can help to determine one's cultural heritage. Wed, Mar 12, 10 am-noon

The Archaeology Of The Etruscans: The Prehistoric Romans Rachael Goldman, PhD, historian

Prior to the establishment of the Roman Republic and the spread of the Empire, the original inhabitants of the Roman peninsula were a highly sophisticated group. Though their language has not been completely translated, much has been interpreted through their archaeological advances, architecture, religious rituals, burial customs and law practices. They were borrowers of Ancient Greek styles and lent much to the Romans. Our understanding of this mysterious civilization helps us to connect with the foundations of World Civilization. Much of the archaeological findings show some of the developments in contemporary architecture, jewelry, technology, and even fashion.

Dr. Rachael Goldman holds a Ph.D. from the City University of New York-Graduate Center in History. She is the author of "Color-Terms in a Social and Cultural Context in Ancient Rome" published by Gorgias Press. She has studied at the Summer Classical School at the American Academy in Rome and won awards from the New York Classical School. She has been published in the journal Glotta, the Bryn Mawr Classical Review, the Classical Journal, the Renaissance Quarterly and the Decorative Arts Journal of the Bard Graduate Center. She has taught at Adelphi University, the College of New Jersey, Rutgers College, and at various schools in City University of New York. She completed the Sotheby's American Fine and Decorative Arts course, and began her career as an appraiser, cataloguing the Asia and Jacobo Furman Judaica Collection. As a specialist for Bonhams, she ushered in the first Judaica sale. Rachael is a certified member of the Appraisers Association of America.



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
